# The Epiphany Proclamation 2025

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the glory of the Lord has shined upon us, and shall ever be manifest among us until the day of his return.

Through the rhythms of time and season, let us celebrate the mysteries of salvation and let us recall the Christian year's culmination: the Easter Triduum of the Lord, which is his last supper, crucifixion, his burial, and his rising from the dead celebrated this year between the evening of the 17<sup>th</sup> day of April and the evening of the 19<sup>th</sup> day of April, Easter Sunday being on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of April.

Each Easter, as on each Sunday, the Church makes present the great and saving deed by which Christ conquered sin and death. From Easter are reckoned all the days we keep holy.

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, will occur on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of March.

The Ascension of the Lord will be commemorated on Thursday, the 29th day of May.

The Day of Pentecost will be celebrated on the 8th day of June.

On the 19th day of June, the most holy Body of Christ, also known as Corpus Christi.

And this year, the First Sunday of Advent will be on the 30<sup>th</sup> day of November.

Likewise, the pilgrim Church proclaims the Passover of Christ in the feasts of the Apostles and Saints and in the commemoration of the faithful departed.

To Jesus Christ, who was, who is, and who is to come, Lord of time and history, be endless praise, forever and ever. Amen.



NOTES ABOUT THE MUSIC: Today's hymns focus on the Gospel lesson, the Baptism of Jesus. The Opening Voluntary is a relatively new piece by my friend, Dr. David Ashley White, the Composer-in-Residence at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church in Houston. The Sarabande was a form for composition in the Baroque period, a dance in triple meter. This organ work is a lyric piece in triple meter, notated to be played expressively.

Our Gloria shifts this week to an excerpt from Schubert's *Deutsche Messe*, the Gloria that we begin singing today. The Sanctus for the same Mass is found in our Hymnal as S-130, but the editors did not include this joyful Gloria. We will sing it through the Epiphany season. Our Offertory is a duet by Amy Thompson and Patty Creel from Vivaldi's *Gloria*. This lovely movement is the text giving praise, adoration, and glory to God. Vivaldi's music echoes the text well, with an ebullient setting of the words, and twists and turns for the singers.
