NOTES ABOUT THE MUSIC: Today's shift from the end of the green Pentecost season to the beginning of the new Church Year, Year C, will bring changes to the service music, the tone of our worship, and the focus of the music. We will be singing new-to-Saint Andrew's Magnificat this season as our Song of Praise, as well as a new-to-Saint Andrew's Sanctus by William Mathias, a 20th-century British composer. The 1979 Prayer Book gives us options of speaking or singing a Kyrie, Gloria, or Hymn of Praise at the beginning of the service, as well as an option to chant the Prayers of the People, as we are doing during Advent at 11:15. Another option to be sung is the Fraction Anthem, which takes place at the breaking of the bread after the Eucharistic Prayer and Lord's Prayer. We will sing the Fraction Anthem this season, repeating the antiphon after the Cantor or Priest chants it and again twice more as indicated.

"Sleepers, Wake" is a great classic German hymn tune, set by many composers, from J. S. Bach, in his chorales and cantatas as we will hear today, to Mendelssohn in his oratorio St. Paul, to Jacques Berthier in the Closing Voluntary. The text and tune come from Philipp Nicholai, a pastor in Unna, Westphalia, during a terrible epidemic from July 1597 to January 1598. During that time, more than 1300 people died, and his parsonage overlooked the churchyard where, on some days, 30 people would be interred. He wrote out meditations to comfort those suffering from the pestilence. Parts of the tune may have been borrowed from earlier works, but Nicholai wrote the tune, commonly known as the King of Chorales.
