





FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 26:1-11

The People sit.


A Reading from the Book of Deuteronomy.

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us." When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me." You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.



NOTES ABOUT THE MUSIC: The Great Litany (labeled "Great" to distinguish it from other litanies in the Prayer Book), which begins our service today, was first published in English in England in 1544, five years before the first *Book of Common Prayer*. It was written by Thomas Cranmer, who drew from other liturgies including Martin Luther's litany. The musical setting also dates from 1544, and is meant to be sung unaccompanied. The composer is unknown, but it is believed to be composed by John Merbecke, whose Rite I settings are also in the *Hymnal*. The Great Litany is sung once a year at Saint Andrew's and many Episcopal and Anglican churches, on the First Sunday of Lent. Today, it will be spoken at the 7:30 Service and chanted in harmony by the congregation and choir at 9 and 11:15. Please add your voice to our petitions!

Today's Anthem, "Let Thy Merciful Ears, O Lord" is a classic choral work from the Tudor era. It was first attributed to Thomas Weelkes (1576-1628) but is now attributed to Thomas Mudd. Mudd was from a musical family, and some of his compositions labeled "Mudd" may have been by him or other family members. Mudd served as organist at four different English cathedrals before his death in 1677. The text of this Anthem is the Collect for the 10th Sunday after Trinity in our current lectionary.

Today's service music (Sanctus and Agnus Dei) is taken from the *Glendalough Mass* by contemporary Irish singer, composer, and Roman Catholic priest, Fr. Liam Lawton. Next Sunday, we will add his Kyrie.
